Welcome and Introductions

DEIJ Workgroup update:

The key informant report is being reviewed by leadership, with the goal to publish early fall. The report summarizes the conversations with community leaders and residents, and lays out council-oriented action items, including:

- Improve engagement at the community level, specifically with residents
- Convene a group of stakeholders invested and engaged in the social determinants of health

Workgroup members announced they are recruiting at least one new member to join the workgroup. The workgroup will begin driving forward some items from the report, and support future council learning activities. The workgroup meets 1-2 times per month (bi-weekly) on Monday's at 9 AM. Policy Updates

- State of Michigan updates no updates (at time of meeting)
- Federal Updates:
 - On July 11, the full Senate Appropriations Committee held a markup of three subcommittee bills, including Agriculture.

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Oakland County FOOD POLICY COUNCIL

- Highlights include:
 - WIC: \$7.697 billion, a \$667 million increase over FY 2024. This ensures all eligible participants can continue to receive WIC benefits and services, in addition to full funding for fruit and vegetable vouchers.
 - SNAP: Fully funds to serve an estimated 42 million people per month and potentially restrictive policy riders were not included.
 - Child Nutrition: Fully funds child nutrition programs to ensure schools can continue to serve healthy meals to all eligible children. The committee estimates that in 2025 it will serve an estimated 5 billion lunches and 2.7 billion breakfasts.

Farm Bill Update

- Both the Senate and House Agriculture Chairs, Sen. Stabenow and Rep. G.T. Thompson respectively, released Farm Bill proposals in May. Read the bill summaries below along with responses to the proposed bills: <u>House Farm Bill proposal</u> & <u>Center</u> on Budget and Policy Priorities response, <u>Senate proposal</u> & <u>FRAC response</u>
- One of the major differences between the two bills centers on SNAP re-evaluations passed in the 2018 Farm Bill. These re-evaluations allow for SNAP benefits under the Thrifty Food Plan to be updated to align with the current Dietary Guidelines and to match the costs of purchasing and preparing food. Without these regular re-evaluations, benefits would be cut for recipients over time.

Advocacy Alert:

- Workgroup members are focused on proposed SNAP changes that could cut benefits for users.
- Amanda connected with Keesa Johnson (MLFCN), and she shared that in person meetings are preferred, and to follow-up with an email to include any additional documents. Social media is also another way to connect with legislators. She stated providing written information through any channel is key.
- Workgroup members are finalizing a one-pager and email template. Once completed, OCFPC Members may use them to connect with House Representatives and Senators Peters and Stabenow.
