JOE FROST

Associate Planner, Oakland County Planning Division

Frost has a wide variety of experience, including as a Main Street executive director, historic preservation advocate, preservation planner and historic site manager. He is a 36 CFR 61 qualified professional architectural historian/historian. In his home community of Oxford, he serves as Village President. Frost has a Master of Science in historic preservation from Ball State University and a Bachelor of Arts in geography from Michigan State University.

DANA WALKER

Director, Michigan Downtown Association (MDA)

After serving on MDA's Board of Directors for two years, Walker became the association's director in March 2019. Prior to MDA, she was the director of the Imlay City Downtown Development Authority for four years and executive director of the Imlay City Area Chamber of Commerce for four years. She has also worked for the Farmington Downtown Development Authority assisting in promotions and sponsorship drives.

Before working for municipalities, Walker owned her own gift shop in downtown Farmington – giving her insight into the needs of small business owners and the challenges downtown managers face. Currently, she is vice chair of the Imlay City Rotary Club and on the Lapeer County Community Foundation's board of directors.
